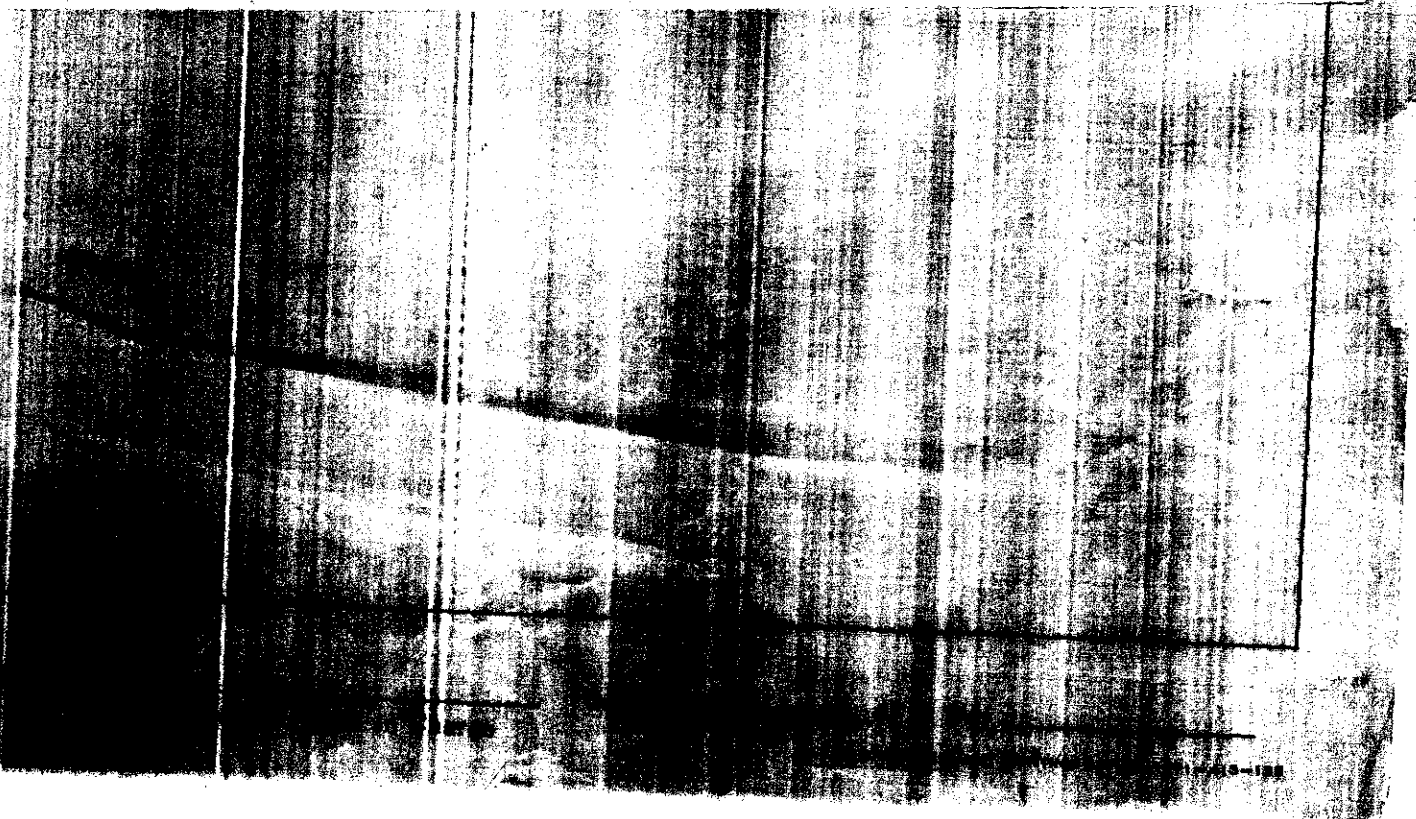

At approximately 12:13 A.M., 7/12/73, a guard of the Federal Protection Service, assigned to captioned records center discovered a fire on the 6th floor near the rear of that building. The guard was not in the building at the time. He immediately reported the fire to the duty desk sergeant and the two attempted to respond to the 6th floor but were driven back by heavy smoke on the 4th floor.

All surrounding fire departments immediately responded to the fire which continued out of control well into the morning.

At approximately 12:00 Noon, 7/12/73, available reports indicated that the 6th floor of the NPRC-M was completely destroyed and the 5th floor partially destroyed. There was extensive smoke and water damage to all other floors.

Over 30 million military records, old and new, were stored in this building.

Bomb and arson experts from the FBI Laboratory, Washington, D.C., are on the scene conducting appropriate investigation.

Log sheets listing both employees and visitors to the building for 7/11/73 - 7/12/73, have been obtained and leads are being set out to locate and interview identifiable

WAS CALLED AND RESPONDED SHORTLY THEREAFTER. THERE ARE 8 TO 10 FIRE DEPARTMENTS AT THE SCENE ATTEMPTING TO CONTROL THE FIRE WHICH, AS OF 2 P.M., WAS NOT UNDER CONTROL. SO FAR, THERE HAVE BEEN 6 FIREMEN INJURED EITHER FROM SHATTERING WINDOWS OR FROM SMOKE INHALATION.

THE RECORD CENTER IS 6 FLOORS WITH 200,000 SQUARE FEET ESTIMATED FOR EACH FLOOR, MAKING SPACE IN THE BUILDING APPROXIMATELY 1,200,000 SQUARE FEET. THE 6TH FLOOR OF THE CENTER IS WHERE THE RECORDS OF WORLD WAR I, WORLD WAR II, POST WORLD WAR II, AND ALL DISCHARGED AIR FORCE PERSONNEL ARE LOCATED. THE FIRE IS STILL RAGING ON THIS FLOOR AND IT HAS BEEN ESTIMATED BY FIRE DEPARTMENT

# Fire strikes Army facility

A general alarm fire swept the sixth floor of the Army Records Center, 9700 Page bl., Overland, shortly after midnight Thursday. It is the nation's major military records center.

Fire companies from the Community Fire Protection District, Overland, Wellston, University City, Maryland Heights, Normandy and Creve Coeur were still fighting the fire at 1:30 a.m.

More than 50 windows were

broken by heat and water from snorkel and aerial ladders of the different fire departments.

Onlookers on the ground said they could see records on shelves burning.

Intense heat kept firemen from entering the building.

At 1:40 a.m. firemen began making an intense efforts to reach the fifth floor when it was reported a man was trapped there without oxygen.

AS SOON AS ENTRY CAN BE MADE INTO BUILDING UNDER SAFE CONDITIONS, FBI SPACE AT THE RECORDS CENTER WILL BE ENTERED AND ALL CORRESPONDENCE RELATING TO FBI RECORD CHECKS WILL BE RETRIEVED AS WELL AS ANY OTHER PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE BUREAU. 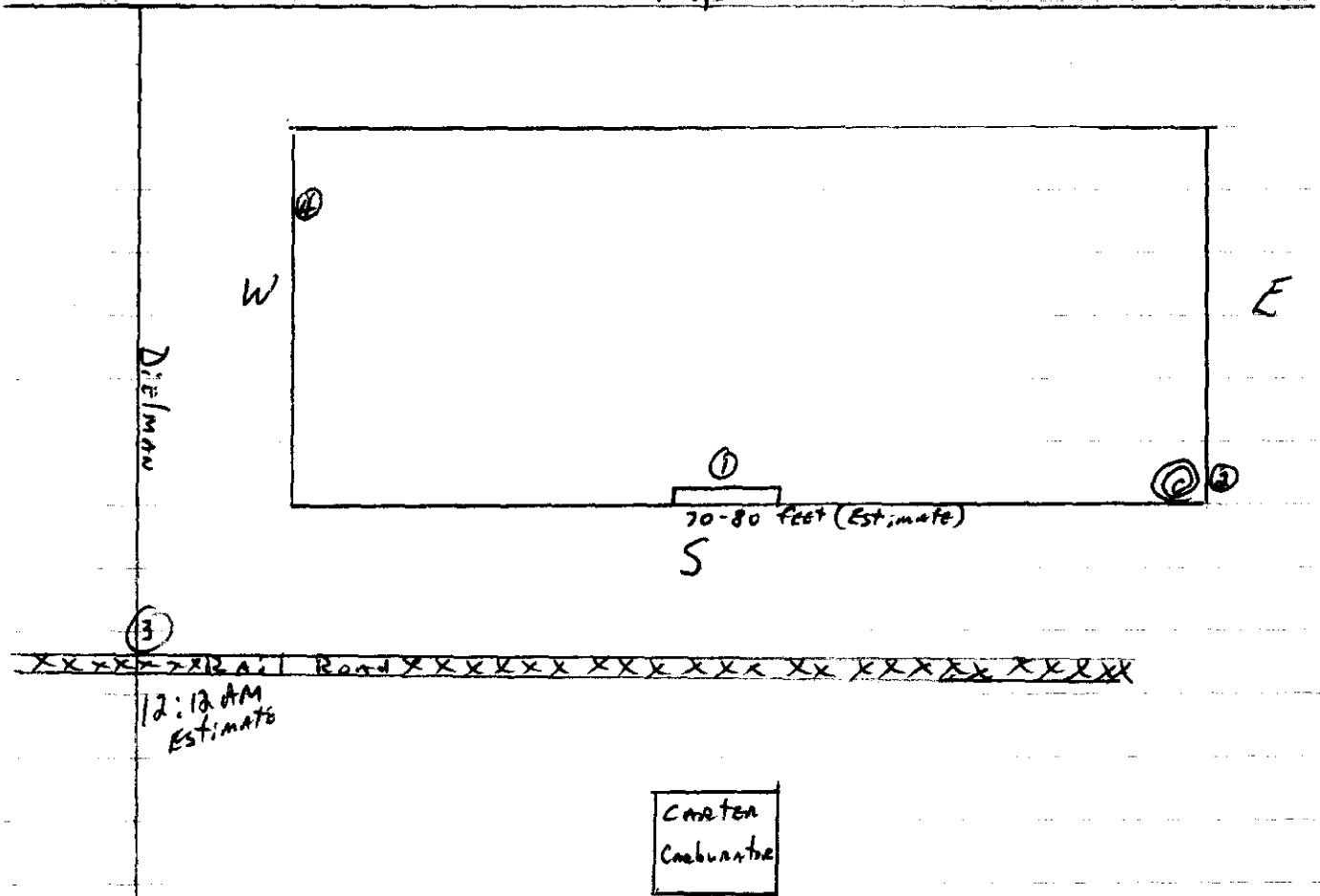

[redacted] advised he is employed by GSA with the Maintenance Force. He goes to work around 3:30 PM each day at the National Personnel Records Center (NPRC). His job consists of removing the trash cans from the building. He works on all six floors. On July 13, 1973, he worked his regular schedule and at 12:30 AM, he was on the first floor. He was there with other members of the Maintenance Force signing out at the guard station. He noticed that the guard was not present. Someone in the crowd said that the guard had gone outside to investigate a fire. A few minutes after 12:30 AM [redacted] supervisor instructed [redacted] and four or five other employees to go up on the elevators to the fifth floor and try to put the fire out. [redacted] and [redacted] took one of the large elevators to the fifth floor. When the door was opened [redacted] described the smoke as being so bad that you could barely see two feet in front of your face. They closed the doors of the elevator and went back to the first floor. [redacted] and [redacted] took a small freight elevator back up to the fifth floor, but the smoke was just as bad there as it was when they traveled to the fifth floor on the large elevator. [redacted] stated that he was on the fifth floor at approximately 10:30 PM and there was not even a smell of smoke. [redacted] stated he had no information to indicate that someone might be responsible for setting this fire. He speculated that it was possibly an accident caused by sparks from the electrical lines servicing the large exhaust fans located at the ends of the hallways of each floor.

He handles the work on all six floors and usually begins at the top and works his way to the bottom floor. He recalls finishing at approximately 11:30 PM, at which time he returned to the fifth floor, west end of the building. He usually checks this area two or three times in an evening since the maintenance force congregates here on their breaks because the food and drink machines are located here. At about 12:15 AM, [redacted] returned to the first floor and checked in his equipment. At 12:30 AM, he signed out on the sign-out sheet provided at the guard station. The guard was not present and a few minutes later he heard everyone talking about smoke on the fifth floor. Shortly after that it was learned that there was a fire going on upstairs on the fifth or sixth floor. 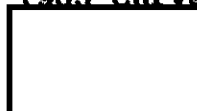

# Extent Of Fire At Center Laid To Security Design

The vault-like security construction of the Military Personnel Records Center has turned out to be the major reason the "fireproof" building blazed out of control for nearly two days, the St. Louis County Fire Marshal said Saturday.

Fire Marshal James E. Holdinghaus said the Records Center fire "shows what fire people in the United States have been trying to get across about fires in high-rise buildings. If the proper safeguards are not built into the building, the firemen don't have a chance. This is a beautiful example."

The blaze, which was discovered early Thursday morning in the center at 9700 Page Avenue, Overland, "amounted to a dump fire six stories high," he said. "Such construction, without a adequate built-in safeguards, expects too much of the fire suppression services.

"There are enough things that could have been built in — smoke vents, heat vents in the building or roof, sprinklers, monitoring systems — to prevent this, or at least hold the fire in check until firemen arrive. In that type of building, if the firemen can't get inside, there's no way to control the fire."

Holdinghaus pointed out that the Federal Government was not under state or local jurisdiction, although the Government usually complied with building and fire code requirements.

"I hope the Federal Government is prepared to learn something from this fire," he said.

The General Services Administration manages the building and is the custodial agency for the records kept at the center.

About 20,000,000 military personnel records were housed on the sixth floor of the building, where the fire was concentrated and eventually controlled. Some water damage is believed to have occurred to records on lower floors.

The building's concrete roof, constructed to allow future expansion, held heat and smoke in the building, preventing firemen from entering the building until Friday morning.

Although federal investigating teams are on hand to search for the cause of the blaze and assess damages from fire and water, officials of the GSA predicted it would be at least Tuesday before investigators could reach the top of the building.

By that time, they believe, the building will have stabilized and the heat will be dissipated. Reports that the fire was the work of an arsonist also will be investigated.

Although some federal agencies contend that the records stored on the sixth floor are irreplaceable, the Veterans Administration has said it had separate records for the 13,000,000 veterans and dependents now receiving benefits.

The sixth floor housed records of Army personnel who served between World War I and the mid 1960s and 30,000 containers of files of Army Air Forces personnel in World War II.

Jeffrey Hillelson, regional administrator of GSA, said federal officials had not been able to make a thorough evaluation of the damage to records on other floors that was caused by smoke and water.

"There is three to three and a half inches of water on the first and second floors and as much as five to eight and a half inches on the fourth, fifth and sixth floors," he said.

"We are not in a position to assess the damage to these records until the firemen get out of the building, which possibly could be Sunday," Hillelson said.

Microfilm, computer storage tape decks and personnel files of employees who work at the record center were removed by tractor-trailer truck Thursday and taken to other storage areas.

The GSA has the power to lease private warehouses and request aid from other government installations to store any records it wants to move from the fire-damaged building.

Hillelson said that, to his knowledge, there was no definite contingency plan at the record center to move operations to other locations in the event of major disasters such as the fire.

"We will be getting into that very soon," he said.

"We always have contingency plans which are prepared to meet several types of emergency conditions but a disaster of this sort could not be foreseen," Hillelson said.

The regional administrator said that Arthur Samson, national director of GSA, authorized him to get the record center back into normal operation.

"As part of that order, I have appointed an ad hoc committee to study all facets of the fire and to make recommendations," Hillelson said.

Employees of the center have been placed on administrative leave with pay until they can return to work.

Dee A. Patterson, acting regional commissioner of public buildings service for GSA, was appointed chairman of the committee.

Patterson, who was reached by telephone at his Kansas City, Kan. home, said he had flown to St. Louis Thursday to survey the fire and the damage.

However, he said he did not obtain sufficient information that would indicate the specific areas his committee should investigate first.

Patterson said he will try to convene the committee in St. Louis on Monday or Tuesday to begin its work.

Other members of the committee include J. C. Spradley, director of design and construction division of GSA; Wendell Sisk, chief of the GSA acquisition branch; Harold Lowe, special assistant to the regional administrator; and James L. Kealing, regional counsel.

Kenneth Bollard, comptroller of reserve component of the Army personnel and administration center, and Forrest Weir of the office of federal records also were named to the committee.

The center, costing \$12,574,850 in the early 1950s, contains about 1,300,000 square feet of space. It took about two years to build and was completed in 1956.

One of the building's architects, George E. Kassabaum, said Saturday he was at a loss to explain how the building ever caught fire or managed to burn for several days.

"To me, it's inconceivable that this could happen," said Kassabaum, one of the members of Hellmuth Obata & Kassabaum architectural firm.

"I don't know what the filing practices or housekeeping practices are now, but when the building was constructed, all material was to be filed in steel filing cabinets. We designed the building so that one standard filing cabinet could be placed atop another. If that's the way they were doing things, what was available to burn?"

Kassabaum said he suggested the use of a sprinkler system throughout the building. However, the suggestion was vetoed

by the Army Corps of Engineers, which was in charge of the construction, and the Army, which was to use the facility.

"We toured several other such storage installations around the country," Kassabaum said, "and none of them had sprinkler systems. Our clients (the Corps and the Army) said water was their worst enemy, because it packed paper together and made ink run. They said water damage was much more severe than any fire could be. We proposed the sprinklers as an automatic

assumption, because the building was to be used for paper storage."

Kassabaum said that no electronic surveillance system was built into the building either because such sophisticated detection systems were not available in those days. He said the building was designed to be guarded through constant personal surveillance.

When told of suggestion made by Holdinghaus to vent the fire through the roof to make the concrete roof more accessible, Kassabaum said the

design specifications didn't call for anything like that.

"The idea was to have a s-

ture building. The Army didn't want a building that someone could get on the roof and chop

holes to get inside. That roof had to be built to withstand additional stories if the government ever wanted to expand."

Kassabaum said the building complied with the building and fire codes in St. Louis County

and Overland when it was constructed.

"But fire codes primarily are concerned with protecting lives. Thus, there aren't too many codes even today that require something to protect the contents of a building," he said.

Although 10 St. Louis County fire departments and a St. Louis company were pressed into service to fight the blaze, University City Fire Chief James Harvey said the county municipalities involved still were well protected.

"I believe we could have handled other fire situations in the county through our reciprocal aid agreements with other departments that weren't involved in the Record Center fire," he said. "The county, collectively, has more fire apparatus than the city."

Olivette Fire Chief Joseph Fitzmaurice, who sent one pumper to the fire scene, said the city's other fire apparatus responded to alarms in Olivette and Creve Coeur during the Overland crisis.

Fitzmaurice said the fire posed no special problems for fire fighters, "it was just one of those dogs that was hard to get to."

The General Services Administration, which took over ownership of the building in 1960, had scheduled the installation of a complete sprinkler system in the building beginning July 1975.

The first floor and part of the second floors already have sprinkler systems, the GSA said.

The GSA is "cautiously opti-

mistic" about water damage in the building.

"One of the reasons is that the intense heat from the fire helped keep the fifth floor drier than we anticipated. Also, all the water has been draining through stairwells, heating ducts, and elevator shafts, and did not flood the main flooring as badly as we thought.

"Most filing cabinets are raised a short distance off the floor, which may also help substantially in reducing damage," the GSA spokesman in Washington said.

On the fifth floor are Navy and Marine personnel records dating from 1885. The fourth floor contains records of Army reservists both active and inactive, and two big computer, valued at \$1,200,000 to handle payrolls and to locate records elsewhere in the building.

The third floor is used by the Army also for employe stations and administration.

Army records from 1960 to the present; Navy and Marine records from 1963 to the present, and Air Force records from 1964 to the present are housed on the second floor. The first floor is for processing and administration.

The Records Center was once called the nation's biggest filing cabinet. The building is 728 feet long by 282 feet wide, and contains 1,349,148 square feet of floor space including the basement. A cafeteria in an adjoining one-story building accommodates 800 persons at one time.

There are seven acres of glass windows.

The Records Center provides

He advised that to his knowledge the only individuals who have the ability to rove the entire Records Center area are the custodians.

[redacted] advised that his Task Force group works mainly on the 1st floor and 2nd floor area of the Records Center. On the night in question no one from his group worked above the 2nd floor. The only exception to this would be during the lunch break people under his control might go to the 5th floor canteen area to obtain lunch. b7C

# All not lost in smoke of records, officials say

By **ANDREW WILSON**

While records destroyed in the fire at the Military Personnel Records Center here are "a great loss," the Veterans Administration has other sources of information "that will minimize any chance of a person losing a legitimate claim," a Veterans Administration spokesman said Friday.

The fire that raged through the two-block-long building at 9700 Page ave. in Overland for more than 24 hours finally was brought under control Friday morning.

The cause of the fire was undetermined, and an arson investigation was being conducted.

Flames are believed to have destroyed almost all of the Army's records on servicemen retired or discharged from 1912 to the early 1960s. These records were stored on the sixth floor, where much of the fire was concentrated.

**THE DEPARTMENT** of Defense also reported that records of more than 300,000 persons released from the Army in the last three years were stored on the fire-damaged sixth floor, including records of some cases pending before the Army Discharge Review Board. The records were not formal discharge papers, but release forms placing servicemen on inactive reserve.

Brig. Gen. Louis Prost, commander of the U.S. Army Reserve Component, Personnel and Administration Center, said less than 1 per cent of the records involved cases pending before the review board.

Some records of persons dishonorably discharged from the Army would be in Army morning reports on file with other agencies, he said.

Dishonorably discharged persons who tried to contest their cases would cause problems

if their records were destroyed because the morning reports do not detail the circumstances of their release from service, Prost said.

**AT A PRESS** conference officials of the General Services Administration were questioned closely about the building's design. The record center has no fire walls to prevent flames from spreading and has sprinkler systems on only the first and part of the second floors.

James B. Rhoads, a U. S. archivist from Washington, D.C., said the GSA did not design the building and that it was transferred from the aegis of the Department of Defense.

Asked if he would store important documents in any building that did not have fire safeguards, regardless of the designer, Rhoads replied, "Not voluntarily."

Officials denied that any highly sensitive documents or papers relating to national security were lost in the fire.

**THE REVIEW BOARD**, an aide to Symington was told, hears appeals from persons who received "less than honorable" discharges from the Army. The Defense Department told Symington it is "uncertain now what impact will result" if records in such appeals cases are lost.

A spokesman for the Veterans Administration in Washington, D.C., told The Globe-Democrat the fire should have "no impact on the 13 million that are currently receiving VA benefits." Records of these persons are filed in 57 Veterans Administration regional offices, 169 hospitals and two insurance centers, he said.

"In addition to these records," the spokesman said, "the VA still has other backup files containing essential information that would facilitate handling of new applications

"Since 1968 our data processing center at Austin, Tex., has kept computer master records on Vietnam veterans discharged since 1968."

**ALSO IN WASHINGTON**, the Veterans Administration spokesman said, are master computer records on 32 million living and dead veterans of all the armed services. Included are dates, branch of service, character of discharge and other information necessary to process claims on school loans, pensions and medical and hospital care.

The only serious problems, the spokesman said, may be encountered by veterans discharged more than five years ago who make their first claim for some kind of Veterans Administration service. However, he said, most initial claims are filed within five years of discharge, so these cases would be rare.

Even in cases where service-connected disability records might be lost in the fire the Veterans Administration could have other ways of processing a claim, he added, such as checking copies of records kept by veterans, requesting affidavits from doctors in military hospitals or friends and civilian medical treatment records.

**IT WILL BE** more of a problem for the VA processing these claims but not for the

individual veteran, the spokesman said, since other sources will have to be located if needed information is found to be in fire-destroyed records.

"We aren't saying it isn't a great loss," he stressed, "but we're trying to point out that as far as VA records are concerned, there are other records and sources of information that will minimize any chance of a person losing a legitimate claim."

He said widows of veterans who meet certain income criteria are eligible for pension without having a complete record of the veteran's military service. Only the dates of service, already on file with the Veterans Administration, are required, he said.

An advisory committee to study all facets of the fire has been appointed and will convene no later than Tuesday, the GSA announced Friday.

The committee is chaired by Dee A. Patterson, acting regional commissioner of public buildings. Other committee members are J. C. Spradley, director of the design and construction division; Wendell Sisk, chief, acquisition branch; Harold Lowe, special assistant to the regional administrator, and James L. Kealing, regional counsel. Kenneth Bollard, comptroller of the reserve component at the center, and Forrest Weir, office of federal records, will serve as ex-officio committee members.

[redacted] was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent as well as the fact that he was being interviewed concerning a possible federal violation in connection with destruction of Government property.

[redacted] advised that he is employed at the Military Personnel Records Center (MPRC) as an intermittent employee and that his job is to search for records. He has been employed there since May 21, 1973, and works from 7:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M. on the sixth floor. He stated that on July 11, 1973, he arrived at work as usual at approximately 7:15 A.M. and noticed no unusual activities or individuals on the sixth floor on that day.

[redacted] stated that about a week or two ago he turned on a fan on the sixth floor which he described as a large floor fan approximately 6' high with 18" blades surrounded by wire protection. Since these large fans often take several minutes to reach their full speed, he did not stay to notice whether the blades began to turn or not. Several minutes later he was notified by a female employee, [redacted] that that particular fan was not to be used in that the wire protection was bent and the blades would not turn freely. He then observed a considerable amount of smoke to be coming from the fan motor and noticed that a small amount of oil had dripped from the fan onto the floor. After unplugging the fan, he wrote a small note on a piece of paper which said "Do not use" and taped this note to the fan. He stated that since that time he has never seen the fan in use although it was never repaired or removed from the sixth floor. He stated that he had no idea whether or not the fan could have been the cause of the fire but felt that this information may be of some use in determining the cause of the fire. b7C

She advised she obtained summer employment at the Military Personnel Records Center (MPRC) on May 13, 1973, where she is employed in a file purification project. She stated that she works the 4:00 P.M. to 12:30 A.M. shift and that she arrived for work on July 11, 1973, at 3:55 P.M. She stated that she spent the entire evening on the second floor and remained there through her lunch hour. She stated that at approximately 12:20 A.M. she was on the first floor and was ready to go home when she heard someone say that there was a fire on the fourth floor. To satisfy her curiosity she took an elevator to the fourth floor and observed a considerable amount of smoke; however, she did not observe any fire and immediately returned to the first floor and left the building. She remained in the area until approximately 3:00 A.M. watching the building burn and observing the firemen in action.

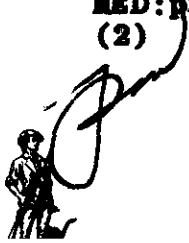

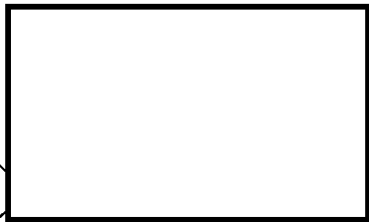

# U.S. urged to pay for fire fighting at records center

U.S. Rep. James W. Symington (Dem.), St. Louis County, has asked the federal General Services Administration to reimburse 28 area fire districts for their costs in fighting the massive fire at the Military Personnel Records Center in Overland last week.

In a letter to Arthur P. Sampson, GSA acting administrator, Symington said the fire placed "an extreme and unexpected burden on the fire-fighting community in St. Louis County."

"Since the records center is federal property," Symington said, "it has never been subject to any fire district tax or levy. Nevertheless, as soon as the fire was reported, every piece of fire-fighting equipment from the Community Fire Protection District and every man employed by the district immediately responded to battle the blaze and save the records of millions of veterans."

**SYMINGTON ADDED** that because of the expense in fuel, man hours and damaged equipment the Community Fire Protection District "may have to hold a bond issue to pay for the losses it has incurred fighting this fire." Twenty-seven other fire departments joined in battling the fire, he said.

"This is severely unjust to the local taxpayers involved," Symington said, adding he believes "the responsibility for this matter clearly belongs to the federal government, not the local taxpayer and property owner."

The records center, unlike Jefferson Barracks VA Hospital in South County, never has paid a fee or tax for fire protection, Symington said. While the GSA probably has no legal obligation to pay for the fire-fighting expenses, he said, consideration should be given to these "corrective measures":

—U.S. government reimbursement to the 28 fire districts for losses incurred in fighting the records center fire.

—GSA payment of fire tax to the Community Fire Protection District on an annual basis, based on assessed valuation of the property.

**"IT APPEARS** that the records center was not in compliance with the existing fire codes" of Overland, lacking a complete sprinkler system which "certainly would have helped to contain the blaze and minimize the loss of records," Symington said in his letter to Sampson.

A GSA spokesman here said Wednesday the records center had a partial sprinkler system on the first through fifth floors but none on the sixth floor, where the fire was concentrated. He said when the building was constructed librarians did not favor sprinkler systems because of fears the sprinklers would be set off accidentally and cause water damage to files and records.

However, the spokesman said, that thinking had changed in recent years and an evaluation had shown that a sprinkler system was needed at the records center. It had been "programmed for 1975" in the sixth-floor area, he said. The heat of the fire did set off sprinklers on other floors, he said, but water damage was less than had been expected.

Most employes of the fire-damaged records center have been on administrative leave (with pay) since the fire, which began last Thursday and raged out of control more than 24 hours. Spokesmen for the GSA and Department of the Army announced Wednesday that "permanent, full-time temporary, summer-hire and summer-aid and civilian personnel assigned to duty at the records center will continue to be on administrative leave through July 25, except for those called to work on essential projects."

In connection with the captioned matter, the following information is set forth in order to assist the Bureau in evaluating the current situation at the military records center in St. Louis. Some preliminary information is included as to what now appears the future of military records kept at the captioned facility.

Before describing operations at the records center, however, some idea of the magnitude of this facility should be set forth. The center measures 728 feet long by 282 feet wide. It contains 1,349,148 square feet of floor space, and in volume is slightly larger than the Empire State Building in New York City.

An adjoining cafeteria known as Building 101 comfortably seats 300 persons at one time. As viewed externally, the building is of concrete slab construction with narrow bands of concrete block separating each floor. The balance of the exterior surface on its four sides is covered by more than seven acres of glass windows. While a part of the first and second floors were equipped with automatic sprinklers, these were not set off by the fire. The balance of the building was not equipped with such devices. No smoke sensing, or other fire detecting devices were included in the building when constructed in the early

1950's at a cost of \$12,574,850. Attempts to have a sprinkling system installed after the building was complete were rejected by GSA as too costly. A punch clock system installed several years ago to insure appropriate guard circulation has not been utilized since the creation of the Federal Protective Service which now guards the building.

A complete inventory of government property in the building at the time of the fire, apart from archives, has not been made; however, the fourth floor contained huge computers valued at \$1,200,000. They were used by the Army for handling of payrolls and for locating records. The GSA also operated a large computer for locating records on the ground floor of this building. Damage assessments to this equipment have not been made. Cleanup operations have not yet started due to instability of the sixth floor, and other safety considerations.

The records center, in terms of archives, contained approximately 63 million military records, stored on six floors. Twenty-three separate filing systems are utilized and are described as follows:

The first floor is devoted to records receiving, GSA computer operations and general records center administrative functions. No records are stored on this floor, but many thousands of records are being processed at any given time. Damage consists primarily of smoke and water damage. Since there is no power in the building, extent of damage to the GSA computer has not been determined. All records on this floor should be recovered.

The second floor is partially utilized for executive offices of the center manager, and the Commanding General of the United States Army Reserve Control Group which also occupies the fourth floor. Tenant agencies such as the FBI, Civil Service Commission and National Research Agency as well as personnel offices for both GSA and the Army Reserve are located here. Approximately one fifth of the floor space is devoted to those office spaces with the balance of approximately 224,000 square feet of floor space utilized for storage of records in

the "registry", "Army AX" systems, and New Air Force registry. Records contained in registry include all Army personnel without reserve obligation since 1960, and all other branches of service since 1964. (Army AX system includes only army records between 1960 and 1964.) The New Air Force Registry contains files of discharged Air Force personnel since January 1, 1972. None of these records are filed by alphabet, SN or SSAN but rather by a registry number assigned to the record when it is received at the center. The registry number is then programmed to a computer, and once filed cannot be located without the assistance of the computer. Should a record be misfiled in this system, it is literally "lost forever", to use the words of Center administration.

The AX, registry, and New Air Force registry systems incurred minimal smoke and water damage. However, extremely high humidity requires that these records and their metal cabinets be chemically treated to prevent rot, mold, mildew and rust.

Approximately 30 percent of the Bureau's work was drawn from 9.5 million records located on this floor.

The third floor of the Center contained 400,000 cubic feet of organizational records, which include unknown millions of individual records pertaining to various military organizational units, dependents medical records, officers clubs, etc. These files are not used by the FBI, as search for a specific document requires highly specialized knowledge, and is extremely time consuming. A recent GSA project to locate several army finance documents for a United States Attorney required three solid days of research by the entire unit established for this purpose.

Also contained on the third floor are three and a half million personnel records in three systems identified as the Bureau of Navy Medicine and Surgery (Bumed), New Navy Registry and New Army Registry.

The Bumed section contains about half of all Bumed records, and are filed by alphabet, the balance having been moved to the fifth floor.

New Navy and New Army Registry's represent all persons totally discharged from those services since January 1, 1972. These records are highly restricted due to recent legislation relating to release of information involving persons who seek assistance for narcotics habits developed while in the service. These records have been minimally smoke and water damaged, but are none-the-less subject to toxic fogging and drying operations. These three and a half million records produce approximately five percent of the Bureau's work at the center.

The entire fourth floor is utilized by the United States Army Reserve Control Group and Personnel Administration Center. Two large computers are located on this floor, as are some four million personnel records for Army enlisted and officer personnel currently having a reserve obligation. While this section is not generally accessible to civilian personnel, it appears to have been more heavily water damaged than the floors below. Brig. General LOUIS PROST, Commander, has reportedly made arrangements for outside space in which to carry on administrative functions of the Control Group, which action was based on the belief that if the building can ever be reoccupied, it will not be ready for a year or more. Whether the records are to be moved, and to where, is not now known, but they, too, will require processing for water and humidity damage. Approximately 20 percent of FBI investigations concern these files.

The fifth floor contains about 15,700,000 records in several systems known as Navy World War I, Navy World War II, Navy Post World War, Marine Corps (MC), Marine Corps Officer, MC Fitness, MC Personnel, Navy Bureau of Medicine and Surgery (Bumed), Coast Guard, Navy Officer, Navy Fitness, Phillipine Army, and Air Force for the period prior to 1964. The latter were in the process of being moved from the sixth floor. Some of the oldest records in the center dating to 1885 were located on this floor. Since each of the above described systems are self-explanatory as to what records they contain, no further description is being set forth other than to indicate that all Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard records for personnel discharged prior to 1964 are located on the fifth floor. All Navy records of personnel

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discharged since then are located in the registry system on the second floor, or in the New Navy Registry on the third floor.

The 15,700,000 records on five are the source of about 15 percent of the FBI's work at the center. Water damage to the fifth floor, while better than previously estimated, is still severe, primarily due to water running off the sixth floor. These records will also require extensive processing due to water and humidity damage. At this time it is planned to totally remove these records from the building to afford safe salvage and demolition operations on the sixth floor. A determination of the structural integrity of the fifth floor which requires the drilling of core samples and other engineering operations also requires the removal of these records.

The sixth floor contained more than 20 million records in five systems identified as World War I, World War II, Post World War, Air Force (prior to 1964) and a section of Army New Registry referred to as 1973 Registry. With the exception of an insignificant percentage of 1973 registry, the records on the sixth floor were totally destroyed. Salvage of any remnants, if attempted, will take many years, and from the standpoint of utilization by the Bureau, they are totally lost. The sixth floor represented up to 30 percent of Bureau work at various points in time, more than that amount during high NA and election activity.

St. Louis is continuing to maintain liaison with records center officials in order to be appraised of all developments in planning for the future of the Center, and disposition of remaining records. Plans for records tentatively scheduled to be removed from the fourth and fifth floors, but not yet made final, will be immediately brought to the attention of the Bureau. St. Louis is also attempting to determine what this office will be permitted, as to future review of remaining records. It must be noted, however, that center employees are being placed on leave without pay, and there are no current plans for recall of employees other than those in key positions. Without adequate facilities and without personnel to make charge-outs and to refile, utilization of the records will not be immediately possible, and may

not be available for a long time to come.

It is estimated that removal of water from the building alone will take three weeks, and that reclamation of the records cannot even begin until the safety of the building has been determined and the water removed.

While a period of six months might bring limited access to some records, a year or more would be more nearly accurate. USARCPAC is proceeding on the belief that a year will be required to make the building occupiable.

Depending on results of analysis of structural data developed thus far, that time estimate may be too optimistic, and a much longer period of time may be more accurate if the building is found unstable. It should be noted that present planning does not include rebuilding of the top floor, which will make the building only a five story building. When the building is reopened, space, of course, will be at a premium.

The above data is furnished the Bureau to provide insight as to the future of military records keeping in St. Louis, and of efforts being made by the St. Louis Division to determine how that future will effect the Bureau's procedures relating to review of military records.

# Record center too damaged to hunt for arson evidence

Any possibility of finding physical evidence of arson at the Military Personnel Records Center in Overland, devastated by fire last week, was ruled out Thursday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Six FBI agents who spent the entire day Tuesday amid the rubble on the sixth floor of the immense structure found damage so complete that further examination would be pointless, Robert G. Kunkel, special agent in charge of the FBI office here, said in an interview.

**"THE ONLY WAY** we'll ever establish arson — if that's what it was — will be through interviews," Kunkel said.

He said more than 80 persons who were in or near the building when the fire started last Thursday have been questioned and more interviews are planned.

The fire centered on the top floor of the six-story building,

two blocks long and a block wide. The center held some 56 million files on armed forces personnel, about 20 million of them on the sixth floor.

"A thorough examination of the sixth floor disclosed virtually complete destruction, at least 95 per cent of the records destroyed and only a

small percentage of them partially salvageable," Kunkel said.

"We also located the probable original site of the fire," he said.

**"WE DETERMINED** that it started near the center of the building, at a point buried under tons of concrete and two to three feet of wet, charred rubble from burned records.

"Because of the collapse of the 10-inch-thick concrete roof in the area, a thorough examination for evidence of arson will not be possible.

"The original fire site is permanently inaccessible and will be demolished as the sixth floor is removed by heavy construction equip-

ment."

The roof shifted seven inches Tuesday, Kunkel said "and as of Tuesday night, people have been pretty much evacuated."

**HE NOTED THAT** the records center, larger in floor space than the Empire State Building and second only to the Pentagon in size, was doused with 50 million gallons of water during the fire, which raged out of control for two days.

Arson was considered a possibility because there have been about a dozen small fires in the building in the last two years, most of them started in wastebaskets, Kunkel noted.

Other possibilities being considered, he said, are accident, spontaneous combustion and electrical faults.

Upon the completion of all other investigation, submit the final results to FBI Headquarters with the notation that military records were not reviewed, if this be the case.

In lieu of a review of the military records, you should request the applicant to produce his discharge and Form DD-214 for review by an Agent. In some cases, it will also be possible to verify the individual's military service by checking his Veterans Administration record. You should continue to check the Defense Central Indices of Investigations records through the Baltimore Division on all applicants with prior military service.

The recording described in my "Statement" (a copy herewith attached) was stored in the Center. Twice before an effort has been made to destroy this recording by arson with extensive damage to government property.

There is one complication in regard to the investigation - the present agent-in-charge of the St. Louis FBI office. This individual, upon learning the details of this case and being a long time favorite of the late John Edgar Hoover, is very likely to do everything that he can to cover up. Surely you will remember that he was transferred to the St. Louis office by Acting Director Gray as a disciplinary action because of a cover up.

Supervision of the investigation obviously should not be by this man and I urge you to take appropriate action.



## Statement

1. In the period, 1946 to 1955, except for a year of service in the Korean War, I was chief librarian at the VA hospital, North Little Rock, Arkansas. In the course of an administrative hearing, which started in 1953 and continued into 1954, with every word being voice recorded, I was witness to the raw intimidation of the hospital personnel officer.

2. The recording of this administrative hearing, in the form of discs, was stored in the hospital administration building, an old brick and wood structure. Most of the testimonies relating to the intimidation, despite a ruling to the contrary by the hearing committee chairman, was deleted from the typed transcript of the hearing.

3. Within a short time there were four incendiary fires at the hospital with destruction of property valued at nearly \$1,000,000. There were two efforts to destroy the hospital administration building.

4. To me, and apparently to others, it was reasonable to assume that the recordings housed in the hospital administration building were the target of the arsonist.

5. A few days after the first effort to burn the administration building I decided to make a visit to the Little Rock office of the FBI. Actually, I had already had a brief conversation, at the hospital, with the two FBI agents who were investigating the fires.

6. My opening statement (herein necessarily paraphrased) was this: "I believe that the intimidation of homosexuals is involved in the fires." With that, the two secretaries who were typing in the office stopped work and prepared to listen. The two agents asked that I go outside the office with them for a continuation of the discussion.

7. Outside the office, in the hall, I was not allowed to proceed further. "You are not the first hospital employee," I was told, "to come to us with such a statement. We have been directed by a high authority to make no investigation of any contention that the intimidation of homosexuals is involved in the fires at the hospital."

8. I made inquiry as to the identity of the "high authority" and was advised that it was J. Edgar Hoover, Director, Federal Bureau of Investigation.

9. The foregoing is, of course, nothing less than the obstruction of justice.

10. This action on the part of J. Edgar Hoover resulted in the following. The FBI made no investigation whatever of my contention (and the contention of others) that the target of the arsonist was the recording of the administrative hearing wherein the hospital personnel officer had been subjected to intimidation and identification as a homosexual.

11. Additionally, there was no public identification of the personnel officer - a friend of Hoover of long acquaintance - as a homosexual.

12. All in all, it was a cover up of a major scandal.

13. I wrote a letter to Senator Fulbright in regard to the foregoing.

14. My letter to Senator Fulbright resulted in my being called to the Little Rock office of the FBI for an "interview."

15. I was told that Hoover was very angry in regard to the letter that I had written to Senator Fulbright. There were threats of action which would be taken against me if I wrote another letter in regard to the case.

16. An effort was made, nevertheless, to convince me that the FBI had "solved" the case. The agents were "suspicious" of several mentally incompetent patients at the hospital and, in particular, [redacted] a World War II veteran. [redacted] had, so I was told, "a criminal mind."

17. Further, so I was told, they had asked that [redacted] be taken from the open ward where he was then assigned and transferred to the hospital's maximum security ward. The medical staff, citing the improvement that [redacted] was making, offered objection to this request on the part of the FBI.

18. I protested against their "solution" of the case - pointing out that their action was a severe punishment for a man who in all probability was innocent. My protest met with ridicule. "The man is insane," so I was told, "and wouldn't know whether he was in an open ward or locked up." I realized that these agents knew nothing about mental illness.

19. [redacted] spent the next fifteen years of his life, from January of 1955 to January of 1970, in the maximum security ward at the hospital. Indeed he was, as he has described those years, "a political prisoner."

20. Finally, after fifteen years of continuous effort, I was able to secure his return to an open ward. Incidentally I devoted a great deal of effort to establishing the fact that [redacted] had never before been accused of any crime.

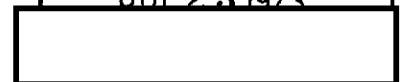
The current situation is that the staff of the facility has been granted administrative through Wednesday, July 25, 1973. A portion of the people have been recalled to work, but the sixth floor of the building will apparently have to be completely removed. The result is that Army and GSA are facing two completely different sets of problems. Army feels they will return to full operation almost immediately, while GSA has suffered record damage that is quite extensive and could affect their staffing seriously. Should this be the case, your assistance in providing outplacement for these people will be vital.

We will provide you with current information as soon as it becomes available and will be requesting your full commitment to solving the problems that emerge.

# No Proof Of Arson At Center

Investigation of the massive fire at the Military Personnel Records Center in Overland has uncovered no evidence to indicate how the fire began, the Federal Bureau of Investigation has reported.

"We've found no physical evidence to indicate arson or to indicate what was the cause," said Charles J. Devic, assistant special agent of the FBI's St. Louis office. He said that possibilities under consideration included accident, spontaneous combustion and electrical faults, as well as arson.

Agents have been in the building, but have not gone yet to the sixth floor, Devic said. Government agencies, including the Federal Bureau of Standards, are testing the structure to see whether the sixth floor is safe to enter.

"It's still possible that it may be unsafe, since it's supporting the weight of the roof and the rest of the material on the floor," he said. He indicated that the tests probably would be completed this week.

Arson has been considered a possibility because the building has had about a dozen small fires over the last two years. Most of these were started in waste baskets, a General Services Administration spokesman said.

FBI agents have interviewed more than 80 persons who were in or near the building last Thursday, Devic said. Most of these persons worked in the building.

The sixth floor held about 30,000,000 paper files on former members of the Army and Air Force. The entire building, a block wide and two blocks long, contained the files of about 56,000,000 armed forces personnel.

A spokesman for the GSA said that the preliminary investigation had indicated that 45,000 cubic feet of records on the first five floors had been damaged by water. "That's out of a total of more than 1,000,000 cubic feet, so we came off pretty well on that," he said.

On the sixth floor, the first look indicated that about 80 per cent of the records had been destroyed. "The only exception is a portion of the new Army registry files, the files on recently discharged personnel," he said. "That appears to be about 95 per cent salvageable."

Most of the 2200 civilian employees at the center will be on administrative leave through next Wednesday, an Army spokesman said. About 50 intermittent employees may apply at the local state employment offices for unemployment compensation.

Some employees may be called to work on essential projects, and others among the full-time and temporary personnel are subject to call when needed, he said. Those on vacation will continue to be held on vacation status, he said.

He stated he worked the midnight to 8:00 A.M. shift at the Records Center and arrived at the Records Center on July 12, 1973, at approximately midnight when he signed in. After receiving his gun from the FPS office located on the west end of the building, he proceeded to the third floor to conduct a routine check of same. He then returned to the first floor to get the sign out sheet for the custodial employees. He was in the process of positioning himself near the east entrance of the building to sign out the employees when he received a telephone call from [redacted] who advised him there was a fire on the fourth floor.

[redacted] took the passenger elevator to the fourth floor where he stated the smoke was very bad and difficult to breathe. He called [redacted] from the fourth floor and told him he felt the fire was on the fifth floor and that he could not make it any further. [redacted] said he heard no explosions nor did he see any flames during this period that he was on the fourth floor.

[redacted] advised that he then returned to the first floor and awaited the arrival of the fire department.

[redacted] St. Louis, Missouri, telephone [redacted] advised that he was employed as a [redacted] with the Federal Protective Service (FPS) at the Military Personnel Records Center (MPRC), 9700 Page, Overland, Missouri, telephone 268-7312. He furnished the following information:

[redacted] stated that he worked the midnight to 8:00 A.M. shift and on July 12, 1973, signed in at the MPRC at approximately midnight wherein he was given his gun and the keys to the FPS vehicle. He stated he left the building through the west entrance at approximately 12:10 A.M. to inspect the FPS car which was parked in the west entrance in front of the steps to the lobby. As he was inspecting the vehicle, a white male approximately 25 to 30 years old, long hippie-type hair, wearing a white motorcycle helmet and riding a small motorcycle, approached him.

This individual, who was unknown to [redacted] advised him that he had observed the fire on the southwest corner of the Records Center. [redacted] entered the FPS car and drove to the southwest corner of the Records Center where he observed the fire burning on the sixth floor approximately one-third down the side of the building in an eastward direction. The flames were shooting out the windows directly above the red computer cabinets which are located on the fifth floor. The blaze encompassed three small windows in the top of the sixth floor.

[redacted] reentered the vehicle and drove back to the west entrance of the Records Center where he reported the fire to FPS [redacted] [redacted] in turn called the Overland Fire Department as [redacted] took the passenger elevator on the west end of the building to the sixth floor.

As the door to the elevator opened on the sixth floor smoke rushed in and [redacted] pressed the button for the fourth floor. He exited on the fourth floor and then walked to the sixth floor via the stairs. He was unable to open the door at the top of the stairs on the sixth floor as the smoke was too heavy. He returned to the fifth floor via the stairs and called [redacted] on a phone.

[redacted] stated he remained in the fifth floor area until members of the fire department had arrived and set up their firefighting equipment in the snackbar on the fifth floor.

[redacted] estimated that approximately 30 custodial people were in the building that evening and would be working throughout the building. According to their schedule, they normally quit at 12:30 A.M. and exit through the east and west doors of the building. To [redacted] knowledge, no one else would be in the Records Center with the exception of individuals who work on the computers on the fourth floor. [redacted] stated that no one works on the sixth floor at night with the exception of the custodial force.

[redacted] St. Louis, Missouri, was interviewed at the Military Personnel Records Center (MPRC), 9700 Page, and furnished the following information:

[redacted] stated that it was his personal opinion that the fire at the MPRC had begun somewhere in the immediate vicinity of upright columns A-17 and A-20 on the sixth floor of the building, which is the top floor. [redacted] based this theory on reports of initial sightings of the blaze and from a physical examination of the debris remaining after the fire was extinguished.

He stated that the first fire alarm was sounded at approximately 12:13 A.M. on July 12, 1973. He arrived shortly thereafter as an initial inspection of the premises was being conducted to determine the exact location of the fire in order that the fire fighting equipment might be directed accordingly. It was first thought the fire was on the fourth or fifth floor. An unusual amount of smoke was encountered in the men's room on the fourth floor near the escalators in the center of the building. A subsequent inspection of the fifth floor resulted in finding a heavier concentration of smoke and the presence of heat apparently radiating downward from the sixth floor.

An inspection of the sixth floor was impossible because of the intense heat and smoke. He stated that the heat was so intense that the face masks of the firemen melted and the black firemen coats turned white in the heat.

Based on the above-described initial inspection, [redacted] felt that the fire had been burning for some time before it was reported, possibly as early as 4:00 P.M. the previous day. As no windows were open nor were any circulating fans operating on the sixth floor, he believed that the smoke was forced to seek a

downward path to the other floors and the path of least resistance was offered by the escalator passages. As the fire continued to burn, the heat built up, forced the flames upward and outward along the ceiling line until they broke out the exterior windows at a point near column A-17 and A-20 on the south side of the building.

A physical examination from the south exterior windows to a point approximately 150 feet north toward the center of the building and bounded by two north - south imaginary lines on the west and east from columns A-17 and A-20 respectively revealed that a great amount of heat had been concentrated in this particular area. As one approaches the center of the building, the metal open shelves which formerly contained military records are twisted and turned and in some places actually melted.

In the area of greatest heat, the concrete ceiling had collapsed on the filing cabinets and on the floor. Military records in this area are completely destroyed and in most places no ash remains. As one progresses southward toward the exterior wall within this afore-described area, remains of the files can be found on the shelves. The ashes progress from practically no remains to powdered white ash to heavier gray ash to charred chunks of files to a point near the south windows where the files are approximately 75% intact with only the edges being burned.

[redacted] advised that since he was interviewed by Special Agents [redacted] on July 12, 1973, he has not seen any of the custodians that work under him at the Military Record Center. [redacted] stated again that he learned about the fire about 15 or 25 minutes after midnight on July 11, 1973. [redacted] further advised that to date he has no suspects concerning the fire.

[redacted] was questioned about the master key that he has access to, and he advised that he seldom ever uses the master key and remembers specifically that he did not use the key on the night of July 11, 1973. [redacted] stated that this key is held by the night guard in the record center. b7C

[redacted] was questioned concerning a [redacted] who may have possibly been on the fifth or sixth floors on the night of July 11, 1973. [redacted] stated that to his knowledge, [redacted] was never on the fifth or sixth floors and was working on the first floor that night. [redacted] further advised, however, that [redacted] are good friends and ride to work together.

[redacted] St. Louis, Missouri, was informed of the identity of the interviewing Agent as well as the fact that he was being interviewed concerning a possible Federal violation in connection with the Destruction of Government Property. [redacted] was advised that he was being reinterviewed in efforts to determine the exact times of his whereabouts on the evening of July 11, 1973. [redacted] stated that he arrived at work at approximately 3:45 p.m. and went to work on the second floor at the Military Personnel Record Center. He worked on the second floor in the corridor until his lunch break at 7:30 p.m. Following his lunch break he went up to the sixth floor where he worked from approximately 8:00 p.m. until 10:00 p.m. He then went down to the first floor where he worked for an additional two hours until shortly after midnight at which time he changed clothes and prepared to sign out and go home. He recalls that he first heard of a fire in the building at approximately 12:25 a.m., when he was on the first floor. [redacted] stated that he is considerably older than the majority of the employees at Military Personnel Record Center and does not associate with his fellow employees. He, therefore, could not recall the names of any of the other individuals who worked on the sixth floor with him.

[redacted] was informed of the identity of the interviewing Agent as well as the fact that he was being interviewed concerning a possible Federal violation in connection with the Destruction of Government Property. [redacted] advised that he is employed by the UNIVAC Division of the Sperry Rand Corporation, 4100 Lindell, St. Louis, Missouri and for the past three to four months has been working regularly at the Computer Section of the Military Personnel Record Center, 9700 Page. He stated that this section is located in the northwest corner of the fourth floor of the building. His regular work shift is from 8:15 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. and that on July 11, 1973, he arrived at work at approximately 8:00 a.m. and departed shortly after 5:00 p.m. He recalled that he brought a sandwich to work on that day and remained on the fourth floor for his lunch break.

[redacted] stated that although he is not familiar with all of the employees on the fourth floor of the building, he did not note any suspicious individuals on the fourth floor on that day nor was he aware of any unusual activities on that day. [redacted] was unable to furnish any information regarding the fire at Military Personnel Record Center.

[redacted] advised he is a [redacted], Air Force Reserve (retired), and resides at [redacted] New Jersey, no home telephone. He produced military identification verifying his military status.

[redacted] stated that he has been corresponding with the MPRC, trying to obtain information from his military file. During World War II he was diagnosed [redacted]. He believes this was an erroneous diagnosis and he has since been examined by private physicians who have told him they could not [redacted] at this time and that it was doubtful if he ever had the disease. In 1966 when [redacted] retired from the service he was initially placed in a rest home, however, he was not confined to the home and has, subsequently, held several jobs.

[redacted] believes that the MPRC has released information concerning his medical history to employers and other people which caused them to treat [redacted] with caution. He said on one instance he was employed by a company and, shortly thereafter, everyone he worked with became very cool to him and would not associate with him. Because of this situation he has been writing the MPRC trying to determine what information is contained in his file. # Records center a lot of damage done

By ANDREW B. WILSON  
Globe-Democrat Staff Writer

The three-day-long fire that destroyed nearly all of 22 million service records on the sixth and top floor of the Military Personnel Records Center has left behind spectacular ruins.

About half the center's roof, about double the area of a football field and made of eight-inch-reinforced concrete, collapsed under the fire's intense heat.

The tall, open metal file cabinets in which most records had been stored were crushed by concrete or distorted into circus-mirror-like shapes by intense heat.

In a press conference after a guided tour of wreckage, federal officials offered only vague answers as to why steps were not taken to prevent a fire of such magnitude.

They also said no decision has been reached on whether the General Services Administration will reimburse fire districts

for expenses incurred in fighting the fire.

IN AN INTERVIEW Monday, Rep. James W. Symington (Dem.), Clayton, said the fire appears to result from "a comedy of errors and inattention" on the part of the GSA and the Army, the center's original custodian and designer.

"Everywhere along the line where they could have taken a useful initiative they didn't. All the way up from the construction through the maintenance," Symington said.

Symington pledged to seek to convince the GSA, to "see the justice and appropriateness" of reimbursing area fire districts for putting out the fire.

During the two days the fire raged out of control from 11:30 to 12:30 firemen were constantly involved in fighting it. More than 30 fire districts responded.

Glen L. Smith, treasurer and a director of the Community Fire Protection District, in whose jurisdiction the fire occurred, said

the fire must have been smoldering at least six hours before it was detected.

HE SAID THE floor was so "superheated" by the time the first fireman opened a fire door that the heat melted his face mask.

He said he is amazed that the floor had no sprinkler, smoke or heat detector or fire walls.

At the press conference Harold (Bud) Nelson, GSA director of accident and fire protection, said he believes only one guard was on duty in the building the night of the fire and that he assumes the guard had checked each floor at least hourly.

When told fire officials said it would have taken about six hours for the tightly packed papers on the floor to smoulder and heat the building to such a degree before detection Nelson said, "It might have taken 10 hours, or it might have been two hours."

NELSON SAID the GSA has been adding sprinkler systems to its records buildings since about 1963 and intended to do so at the building here.

"Frankly we had run through almost all the record centers on this (sprinklers) except for this one and one in New York," he said.

"You can't just do all this at once" was his answer to why the sprinkler system had not been completed here a full decade after GSA's initial decision to install sprinklers in its buildings.

George Begg, GSA's manager of the restoration project, said the building's sixth floor will be removed in the next three months.

He said structural repairs and work will cost from \$6 million to \$10.5 million. The cost of "restructuring" lost records from other sources was estimated at from \$4 million to \$7 million.

[redacted] advised as follows:

He is employed as a [redacted] employee with the General Services Administration, Public Building Service at the NPRC, 9700 Page, where he cleans the bathrooms on the second floor. He stated on July 11, 1973, he was working the 4:00 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. shift. He is primarily assigned to the second floor, but he can be assigned to other floors if he finishes his work ahead of time, people are on leave, sick, etc.

He stated on July 11, 1973, he was on all of the floors of the Records Center including the sixth. He noticed nothing unusual and stated that at approximately midnight, almost everyone in the Records Center goes down to the first or second floors to sign out.

He stated there are usually only three people employed on the sixth floor:

- [redacted] who cleans bathrooms
- [redacted] who cleans the office areas on the west end of the building
- [redacted] who cleans the offices on the east side of the building.

He advised that to the best of his knowledge, the above three individuals do not go into the record section of the sixth floor unless they have to and stated he does not go into the record section unless he has to. He advised the record section is "extremely hot" as the air-conditioning in the building is shut off at 5:00 p.m. He advised he could think of no one who would want to start the fire and stated he himself did not.

He advised that he noticed a white male, approximately 34 to 35 riding a little red Honda motorcycle, who at approximately midnight, told the guards at the Records Center where the fire was located. When the Fire Department arrived, they came to the front of the building instead of the back where the fire was located. This was approximately 12:30 a.m. He stated he observed the fire from outside the building and that when the water from the fire hoses hit the cardboard file cabinets, which were on fire, it knocked the file cabinets inward thus spreading the fire to the interior of the building.

He advised that there are always small fires at the Records Center, but that these have always been put out in time. He stated there was a fire in one of the paper towel disposals in one of the bathrooms he cleans, but that this was also put out in time.

He advised that on July 11, 1973, he worked on the second floor exclusively. He stated he went on break from 9:45 - 10:00 p.m. to the fifth floor, west end, where a small lounge area is located with Coke and sandwich machines. He met [redacted] there at 9:45 p.m. He stated [redacted] cleans offices on the east end of the building on the sixth floor. After his break, he went back to work on the second floor and [redacted] stated he was going back to the sixth floor and turn on the lights.

At approximately 10:30 or 10:45 p.m., he went to the fourth floor, Financial Office, which is air-conditioned. This office is cleaned by [redacted] and he stated that he, [redacted] were there for approximately 30 minutes to take advantage of the air-conditioning.

At approximately 11:30 p.m., he and [redacted] went to the second floor to clean a rug. While they were doing this they talked to the guards, one of whom is named [redacted] (last name unknown).

He stated that he did go up to the sixth floor at approximately 7:00 to 7:15 p.m. to get [redacted] to go home for lunch at 7:30 p.m. He was on the sixth floor not after 7:15 p.m. and he would say this "positively".

He stated there are "alot of spots" in the building where employees sleep and/or smoke, but he can not say for sure if any of these are on the sixth floor. In his opinion, if anyone wanted to smoke, they would do it in the office where they could sit down in a comfortable chair and not in the file areas, which are extremely hot.

He stated he left the NPRC at 12:30 a.m. on the "button" as they would not open the doors until 12:30 a.m.

He advised he heard about the fire approximately 12:10 a.m. from [redacted] and that when he left the building at 12:30 a.m., he first saw the fire at that time. He stated that it was approximately another ten or fifteen minutes after this before the firemen started putting any water on the fire.

When he first saw the fire, it was located on the south side of the sixth floor, approximately 50 feet east of the center of the building at the windows. At this time the flame was approximately ten feet wide and went from the floor to the ceiling. As he observed this, he could also observe the west side of the building and he did not observe any fire at that location.

All of the lights were off and he did not observe or smell any smoke or fire, or anything unusual. He stated he then went to the first floor where he put his cleaning cart away and then went to the second floor to a little room near the guard's office where he read a magazine. He stated the time was then approximately 12:10 or 12:15 a.m., July 12, 1973. As he was reading the magazine, he thought he heard someone say that a car was burning in the parking lot, but attributed this to the fact he does not hear very well due to his being in a artillery unit in Vietnam. He then heard someone say there was a fire on the fourth or the sixth floor. This was approximately 12:20 a.m. He stated the Fire Department arrived by 12:25 a.m.

He stated he has a pretty good idea who smokes marijuana in the building and stated he has seen people smoking marijuana, but did not want to implicate anyone. He stated that he himself formerly smoked marijuana, but does not smoke it at the present time. He stated he gave up smoking cigarettes one and one-half years ago. He stated that he was pretty sure most of the younger veterans employed in the building have smoked marijuana before and that they have probably smoked it in the building. He advised that he is "positive" no one was smoking either cigarettes or marijuana on the sixth floor on the night of the fire.

He stated that at least twice a week, people go to the file section on all of the floors to smoke marijuana or cigarettes. He stated that he either sees or hears of the same people doing this.

At this stage of the interview [redacted] was asked if he would take a polygraph test about the above statements and stated he would.

[redacted] then stated that he has smoked cigarettes and marijuana in the NPRC on the sixth floor and other floors. He stated that the younger people employed in the building "definitely" smoke all over the building, but that approximately one month ago, he heard that a friend of his, [redacted] was stopped by a Federal Bureau of Investigation Agent in the building regarding [redacted] bringing narcotics into the building. [redacted] stated that he "really became paranoid" over the smoking of marijuana in the building after this incident with [redacted]. He stated that the odds are [redacted] has smoked marijuana, but would not state whether he has ever seen him smoking in the building.

By this time, all of the computer equipment was shut down. [redacted] then walked downstairs to the second floor and they heard someone yell to evacuate the building. [redacted] left the building, walked around to the back of it, and there observed the fire. At this time, it was centrally located on the sixth floor in the back, behind one of the big exhaust fans. The flames had broken the glass and were lapping over the roof. The flames at this time were approximately 40-50 feet wide. He stated that almost immediately the flames started jumping sideways with great repetity.

He stated he left at approximately 2:30 a.m. and at that time the entire sixth floor was not engulfed in flames.

[redacted] stated that from his experience working in the records section, he feels the records section could not burn or spread that quickly due to the fact the records are tightly packed into very heavy cardboard boxes. On the evening of July 11, 1973, [redacted] worked entirely on the fourth and fifth floor and did not have occasion to go to the sixth floor. [redacted] said he knew of no one he had come in contact with at the record center who would be desirous and capable of destroying the building. He said he first became aware of the fire at approximately 12:15 A.M., when he went to the second floor of the building to sign out for the evening. At that time his [redacted] told him there was a fire in the building. [redacted] then decided to go take a look at the fire and left the second floor via the stairwell, and climbed to the sixth floor. This particular stairwell, [redacted] said, was the one nearest the main entrance desk on the west end of the building. He stated he left the sixth floor at approximately 10:30 to 10:45 p.m. to go to the fourth floor, Finance Section Office, which is air-conditioned. He stated that the air-conditioning in the building is shut off after 5:00 p.m. and it is "extremely hot". 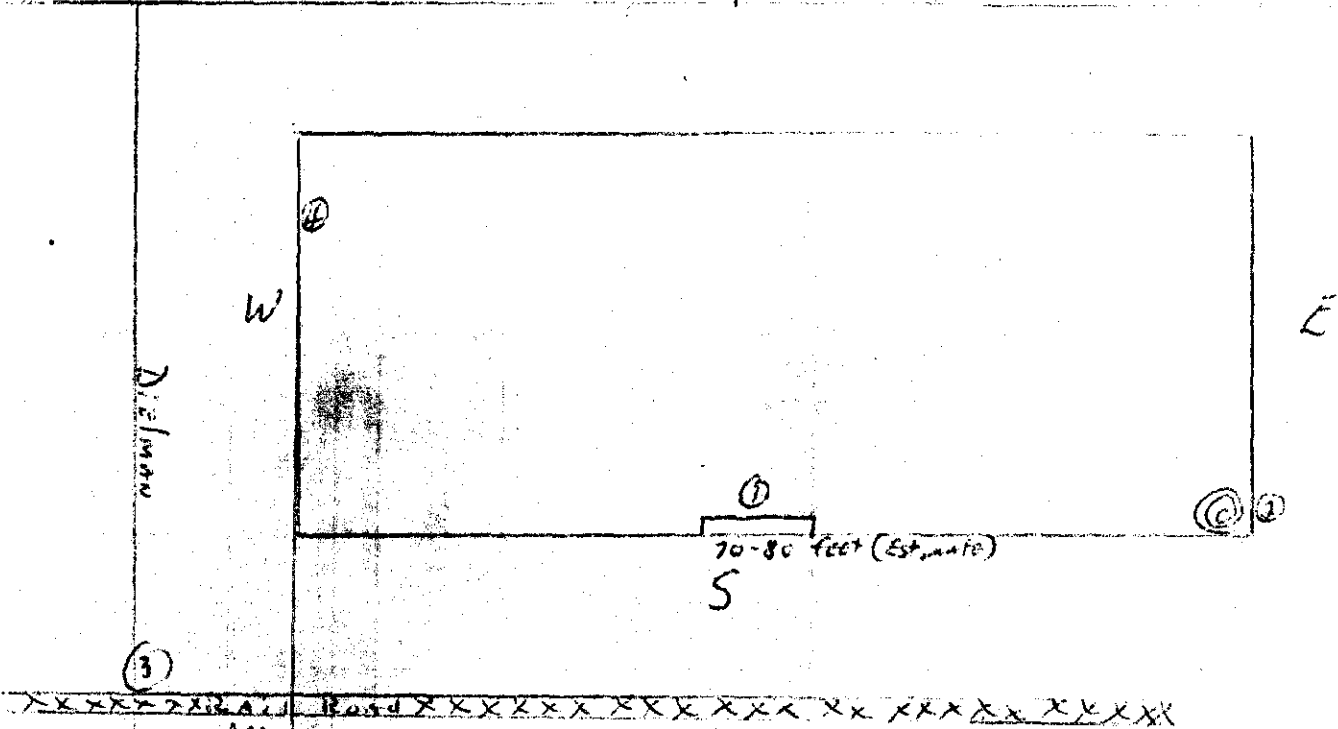

[redacted] National Personnel Records Center (Military  
Branch), advised that considerable progress is being made  
toward rehabilitation of the Records Center. Records are  
gradually becoming accessible for recovery, but [redacted] in-  
dicated that it will be sometime before operations at the  
Center permit general access to records. Water removal,  
fogging and demolition operations continue, but a consider-  
able portion of the 50-million gallons of water poured into  
the building remains.

In addition, J. S. ALBERICI CONSTRUCTION COMPANY,  
which is the prime demolition contractor, has forbidden  
access to that portion of each of the five lower floors  
directly beneath demolition operations. This amounts to  
the rough equivalent of one third the length of the building  
on each floor. This requirement stems from fear of dropping  
huge chunks of concrete from the roof structure weighing  
in the neighborhood of ten tons each. [redacted] reports that  
if dropped, the concrete would go to the basement. Additionally,  
if the boom of the huge crane used to do this work were to be  
pulled down or broken, it is feared the boom would slice  
through several of the floors.

[redacted] also indicated that negotiations are currently being conducted regarding the future location of the United States Army Reserve Control Group which has occupied the fourth floor. While [redacted] [redacted] desires to remain in the building, General Services Administration wants them to seek headquarters elsewhere, due primarily to space considerations.

The sixth floor will not be rebuilt, and if the Army returns to the fourth floor, space in the building will be at an extreme premium.

[redacted] said that "dickering" over space requirements and allocations is presently being conducted. He could offer no advice as to when or whether tenant activity such as the Civil Service Commission, Social Security Administration, National Research Agency, Veterans Administration and the FBI would be afforded space, or if so, how much. b7C

[redacted] estimated it would be several weeks before any space would be available due to safety factors from ceilings which continue to fall, and from tile floors which are lifting due to water damage. Repair efforts alone are expected to interfere with and probably delay access to any space in the building.

A visual inspection of FBI Office space on 7/30/73 indicates it is generally in good condition but the floor is under water and much of the tile floor is beginning to lift. The ceiling appears water or moisture saturated and appears to be tenuous at best.

[redacted] also suggested an alternate source of military record information as the Automatic Data Processing Center of the Veterans Administration, Austin, Texas. [redacted] indicated that information filed there will consist of little more than name, rank, serial number, and possibly the type of discharge. It will not indicate the period of service, medical or performance data, and will not reflect records of court-martial. This information being offered

for whatever instruction the Bureau desires to afford all field offices as to the availability of the above data.

Bureau will be periodically advised of the Records Center status as developments occur.

[redacted] of [redacted] Missouri, telephone [redacted] was interviewed at his residence and supplied the following information:

[redacted] advised he is presently employed at the Army Publications Center located at 1655 Woodson Road, St. Louis, Missouri which is located directly behind the Military Records Center, 9700 Page Boulevard.

[redacted] stated that he has been employed at the Publications Center for approximately three years, and describes his work as that of a [redacted]

[redacted] further advised that on July 11, 1973 he was performing a 3:15 P.M. to 11:45 P.M. shift. At approximately 12:15 A.M. that evening, [redacted] advised that while driving from the Publications Center passing the Records Center in an attempt to exit on Page Boulevard, he observed smoke emanating from the top floor of the Records Center. [redacted] stated that in an attempt to get a closer look to see where the smoke was coming from he drove his car to a position facing the south side of the building. At that time at the southeast corner of the building [redacted] stated he observed smoke and approximately five different blazes on the sixth floor of the Records Center. The blazes were as [redacted] described rising to approximately two feet above the window ledge on the sixth floor and were separated approximately ten feet apart. Furthermore [redacted] stated the blazes which he saw covered an area from the center of the building to the southeast corner of the building.

[redacted] advised that when he first observed the flames they appeared to have been going "pretty well" by the time he observed them. [redacted] stated after noting the seriousness of the fire, he immediately proceeded to the west side of the building to alert the guard who was stationed there at which time he was met in front of the building by that same guard who advised he was aware of the fire.

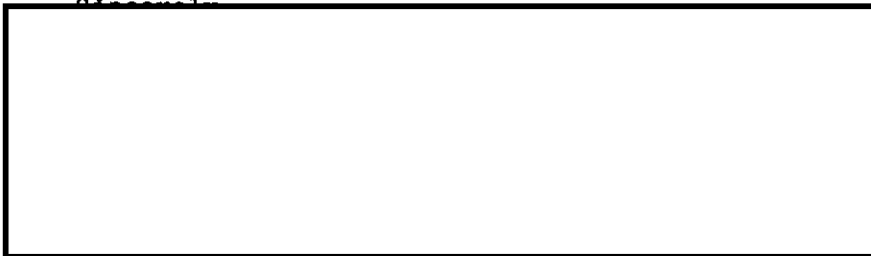

# Hopes U.S. Will Cover Records Fire Expense

Representative James W. Symington (Dem.), Clayton, is pressing efforts in two directions toward compensating the 11 metropolitan area fire departments that responded to the fire last month at the Military Personnel Records Center, 9700 Page Boulevard, Overland.

At a press conference today, Symington said officials of the General Services Administration, which operates the building and is in charge of the millions of personnel records contained there, "were receptive to the idea of reimbursement and are awaiting only the General Accounting Office's determination of their legal authority to do so."

If direct compensation is not possible, Symington said he would introduce legislation this fall to provide the compensation, together with legislation to prevent a similar problem in the future.

Symington said the total compensation amounted to \$16,643, which covers \$15,576 for supplemental manpower expenses, \$1402 for fuel and \$663 in lost or damaged equipment.

The fire broke out July 12 in the two-block long building and burned out of control for two days. The greatest damage was on the sixth floor, although other floors suffered water damage.

About 20,000,000 Army records from 1912 through 1960 and World War II were destroyed. Renovation of the building is

expected to cost \$13,000,000.

If his legislation had been on the books at the time of the fire, the departments could have applied for compensation through the Protection Assistance Administration for compensation.

Concerning the fire itself, Symington said the Federal Government "could have and should have done much more to prevent the tragedy."

"I am quite concerned that this fire could have been prevented and that other federal buildings might be similarly lacking in effective fire preventive equipment." He said he had suggested the fire as "an appropriate subject of interest" to be investigated by the House government activities subcommittee, headed by Representative Jack Brooks (Dem.), Texas.

"I invited Brooks to join me in requesting a full investigation by the General Accounting Office into the measures taken to prevent and contain possible fires at the Records Center and the fire protection practices employed nationally by the General Services Administration. I think a complete review by the independent, congressionally controlled General Accounting Office is required."

"The General Services Administration regional office in Overland Park is conducting an investigation of the fire protection award at the time it was burning. Apparently, the GSA felt the fire protection practices there were highly commendable," Symington said.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

Following is my understanding of NPRC(MPR) policies with regard to liaison offices and tenant activities, including RCPAC.

1. Personnel of the Liaison Offices and Tenant Activities (including RCPAC) may NOT enter GSA file area. GSA will perform all searches for these offices.
2. Until August 15, only emergency type requests will be processed for Liaison Offices and Tenant Activities. After that date, routine inquiries will be accepted.
3. Liaison Offices and Tenant Activities may move back into their offices provided they get a clearance from [redacted] Such moves will be with the understanding that they are TEMPORARY pending further space determinations, and also with the understanding that electrical outlets and telephones may not be available for some time.
4. At this time, there will be no loans of records outside the building, except for RCPAC at the GEM store. RCPAC will pick up and return records. (If arrangements are worked out for CSC agents to work at CPR, records may be transported by NPRC to that location.)

For information of the Bureau, segments of the Records Center Building, the sixth floor of which is undergoing demolition, are scheduled for final safety inspection the week of 8/20/73. If no serious safety factors are uncovered, portions of the building will become available for use.

At this time limited record keeping operations are being carried on in the cafeteria building, largely to meet heavy correspondence from persons making inquiries regarding their own military records and which were stimulated by news of the fire.

Access to remaining records is still frozen for tenant agencies, and access to large sections of each floor beneath demolition operations will be prohibited for some time to anyone at all.

Regarding information previously furnished the Bureau relating to use of the Veterans Administration Automatic Data Processing facility at Austin, Texas, further investigation into the matter reflects that data available there is severely limited, and would not serve the Bureau's purpose in making record checks. In order to query the VA computer, name, rank, serial number, date of birth, and place of birth is required. The computer response will merely verify this information, plus furnish a "C" number. The "C" number in no way indicates that a VA claim has been made or that there is a VA record in existence somewhere else. Information as to whether a VA claim had been made, and in what region would also be necessary for any use to be made of this information. Because of the very small number of cases in which a record might be located through this means during any given month, it is not felt the use of the VA's Automatic Data Processing is feasible for Bureau purposes, and it is recommended that no further action be taken regarding its use.

My purpose in writing is twofold--first, I want to thank you for the generous cooperation extended to the National Archives and Records Service during the recent fire at our National Personnel Records Center in St. Louis. Secondly, I want to give you a brief status report on our progress to restore services.

Your message (122149Z July 1973) to the Secretaries of the Military Departments, sent at our request, advised them to hold all inquiries and transfers of records to St. Louis until further notice.

I am pleased to inform you that we will resume limited reference service on August 15, 1973. Therefore, the Military Departments may forward inquiries to St. Louis except for those inquiries relating to Army personnel discharged during 1912 through 1959, and Air Force personnel, whose surnames begin with letters I through Z, discharged during 1947 through 1963. We will advise you later when we will be ready to resume service on those records. We will also resume accessioning personnel and medical records of separated military personnel on October 15, 1973.

I will appreciate your informing the Military Departments of our resumption of limited service. We will keep you advised of any future developments that will affect the various services.

the National Personnel Records Center - Military, 9700 Page Boulevard, St. Louis, advised that records not destroyed in the fire or through water damage are available for review and that requests from the FBI will be accepted for processing. This means that military records for the various services will again be available for review except those records relating to Army personnel discharged during 1912 through 1959, and Air Force personnel, whose surnames begin with letters I through Z, discharged during 1947 through 1963. These were the records located on the sixth floor at the Records Center destroyed by the fire and include records from World War I, World War II, Post World War, and Air Force as indicated above. Some 20 million military records are included in this category.

Since it is recognized that requests will be made by field offices which may involve records falling within the above category because the field office making the request may only have a name and a military serial number, it is recommended that the field offices not attempt to make a determination as to whether or not the request falls within the exception category, but rather to have St. Louis make that determination. Then there would be no restriction placed on the field in the submission of military record review requests.

If, after making the proper check here and it is determined that the particular record sought for review was one of those destroyed and in the exception category, that particular request will be returned by St. Louis to the requesting office with the notation, "Military record destroyed by fire." This would serve as a flag to preclude any future request being made for a review of that particular military file. This would differ from a request being returned to the requesting office with a negative notation indicating that the military record could not be located based on the information available. This means that a file probably does exist but could not be located based on the amount of information furnished and a follow-up request could be made if more identifying data is developed. By having the "Military record destroyed by fire" notation, follow-up requests would at least be eliminated.

A point that should be brought to the Bureau's attention is the fact that new security procedures have been placed into effect by the Records Center management as a result of the fire. Hereafter, no non-national archives or non-record service personnel will be permitted in the file areas or permitted to conduct military record searches. This means that once our requests are made for military records, we will have to wait until Records Center personnel search, locate, and make the records available for review. Sole dependence on their personnel will make meeting deadlines difficult since it can take up to at least two weeks in some instances for them to locate records requested by us if the records are out of jacket or cannot be readily located for other reasons.

We will, however, make every effort once the records are in our possession to expedite the reviews. The Bureau's consideration in this regard will most certainly be appreciated.

In accordance with the Bureau's instructions, St. Louis will direct a communication to all field offices advising that submission of requests to St. Louis for review of military records can be resumed in accordance with procedures that were in effect prior to the fire.

Enclosed for the Bureau is a copy of the communication to be sent to all offices and unless advised otherwise by the Bureau by 8/28/73, St. Louis will advise all offices.

Various contacts on a local basis with the Center's Safety Office, the Public Building Service, the National Archives and Records Service, the Federal Protective Service, and the Regional Security Office of the General Services Administration have failed to develop any information whatsoever that the fire was caused by arson.

The Ad Hoc Committee established to investigate causes for the fire, according to sources at the Record Center, has learned through the utilization of experts in investigation of fire causes that a fire of the intensity experienced could readily have developed in a very short time from a number of natural causes, given the means of records storage at the Center. It has also been learned that the extent of destruction is being at least partially attributed to the technique used in fighting the fire. It has been suggested that a lack of experience and knowledge on the fighting of this kind of fire contributed substantially to the amount of resulting damage.

Inasmuch as investigation conducted since submission of the referenced report contains no significant information as to the cause of the fire and since no evidence whatsoever has been developed to indicate that the fire was caused by arson, no further investigation is being conducted at St. Louis and the case is considered closed.

Should information develop which bears on the cause of the fire, it will be immediately brought to the Bureau's attention.

[redacted] advised he has been employed at the record center since June, 1972, as a GS-1 [redacted]. His normal working hours are 4:00 to 12:00 A.M., and his areas of responsibility at the center are the fourth and fifth floors.

On the evening of July 11, 1973, [redacted] worked entirely on the fourth and fifth floor and did not have occasion to go to the sixth floor. [redacted] said he knew of no one he had come in contact with at the record center who would be desirous and capable of destroying the building. He said he first became aware of the fire at approximately 12:15 A.M., when he went to the second floor of the building to sign out for the evening. At that time [redacted] told him there was a fire in the building. [redacted] then decided to go take a look at the fire and left the second floor via the stairwell, and climbed to the sixth floor. This particular stairwell, [redacted] said, was the one nearest the main entrance desk on the west end of the building. Upon arriving on the sixth floor, [redacted] observed smoke coming out of the sixth floor doors and seemingly flowing into a nearby elevator shaft. [redacted] opened a door in the hallway which leads to the file section on the sixth floor in the southwest corner of the building. He walked over to the south side of the building where the windows are located and said that the west one-third of the building on the sixth floor in the file section was not on fire and was relatively clear of smoke. However, as he looked toward the east end of the building and began walking in this direction, he ran into a solid wall of heavy dense, grayish-black smoke. He estimated that this covered the other two-thirds of the floor. At that time he left the file area and entered into the hallway; and tried to close a few doors that were opened to the file section.

[redacted] emphasized on the west one-third of the sixth floor he did not observe any flames and the area was relatively clear of smoke. He said on his travels to and from the sixth floor he did not observe anyone else.

At approximately 3:45 A.M., he received a report that smoke was coming out of the windows on the east side of the record center building and walked from the south side to the east side to the vicinity of the east entrance. Observed were two guards from the record center wearing blue uniforms. Both were standing approximately 50 feet from the east door and engaged in conversation with each other. b7C

One of the guards was a light complected Negro, approximately 6'2" to 6'3" tall, with a well trimmed mustache and probably in his upper 50's. The second guard was a dark complected Negro approximately 5'10" tall, possibly in his early 40s. According to [REDACTED] the first guard may have been a Sergeant as he possibly had stripes on the arm of his uniform and possibly a gold stripe on his cap. This guard also seemed to be the second guard's superior.

The conversation the guards were engaged in concerned two individuals who entered the east door of the center at about 11:45 A.M., July 11, 1973, just prior to the fire being discovered. The taller guard asked if they were employees. This other guard, the shorter of the two, replied that the center was hiring a lot of college kids and thought that the two individuals who entered the building might have been part of this group. There was talk about the guards entering the building but not locating these individuals. There was also talk about the guards either radioing for or going for help in an attempt to locate the two individuals.

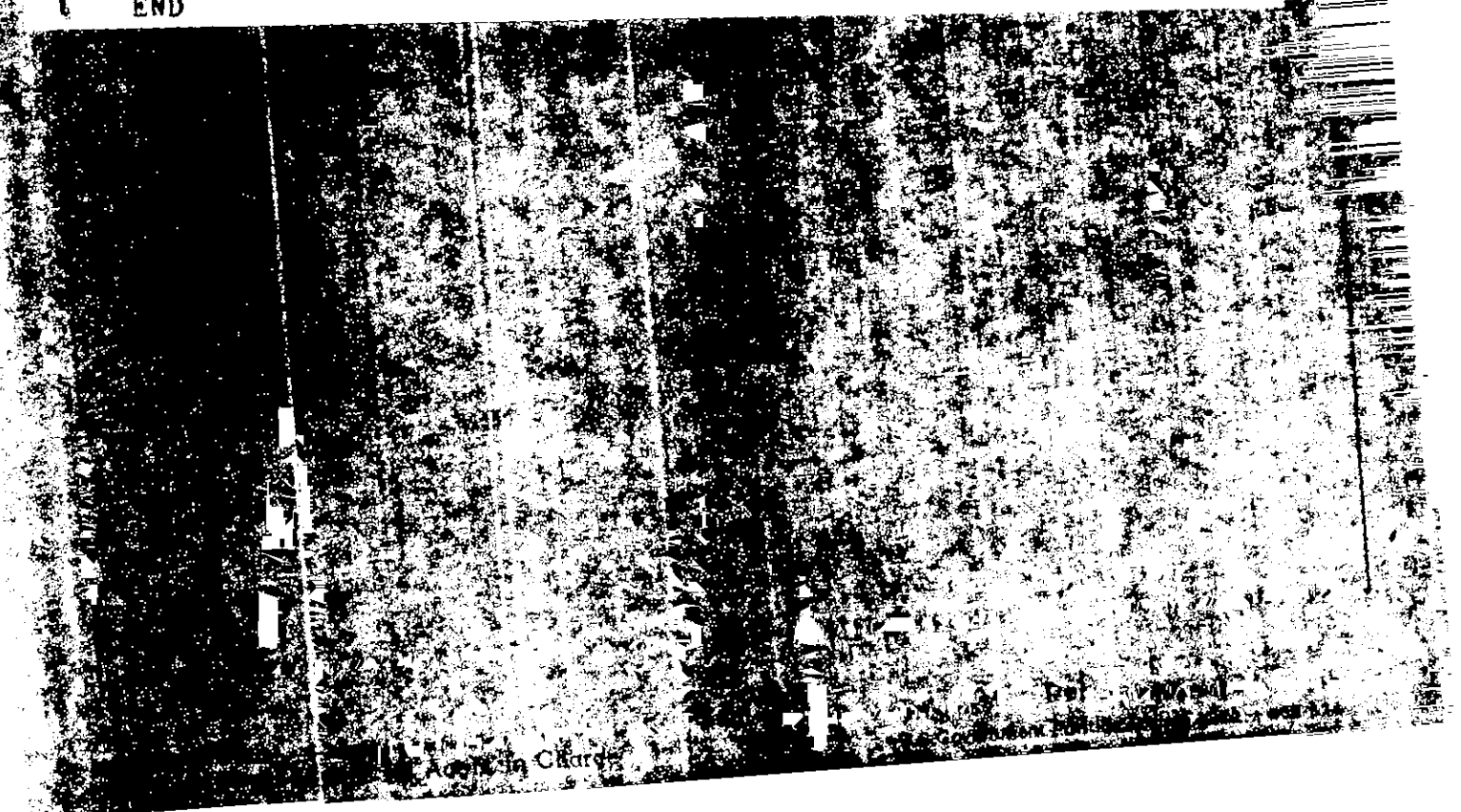

I think I broke the hot end off in the hole, and then threw the cigarette butt to the floor. I looked down at the cigarette butt and didn't see no red, and I thought it was out. I then returned to the third floor and started cleaning on the escalators again. I was alone again, except for [redacted] who was working nearby.

# Record center too damaged to hunt for arson evidence

Any possibility of finding physical evidence of arson at the Military Personnel Records Center in Overland, devastated by fire last week, was ruled out Thursday by the Federal Bureau of Investigation.

Six FBI agents who spent the entire day Tuesday amid the rubble on the sixth floor of the immense structure found damage so complete that further examination would be pointless, Robert G. Kunkel, special agent in charge of the FBI office here, said in an interview.

**"THE ONLY WAY** we'll ever establish arson — if that's what it was — will be through interviews," Kunkel said.

He said more than 80 persons who were in or near the building when the fire started last Thursday have been questioned and more interviews are planned.

The fire centered on the top floor of the six-story building,

two blocks long and a block wide. The center held some 58 million files on armed forces personnel, about 20 million of them on the sixth floor.

"A thorough examination of the sixth floor disclosed virtually complete destruction, at least 95 per cent of the records destroyed and only a

small percentage of them partially salvageable," Kunkel said.

"We also located the probable original site of the fire," he said.

**"WE DETERMINED** that it started near the center of the building, at a point buried under tons of concrete and two to three feet of wet, charred rubble from burned records.

"Because of the collapse of the 10-inch-thick concrete roof in the area, a thorough examination for evidence of arson will not be possible.

"The original fire site is permanently inaccessible and will be demolished as the sixth floor is removed by heavy construction equipment."

The roof shifted seven inches Tuesday, Kunkel said, "and as of Tuesday night, people have been pretty much evacuated."

**HE NOTED THAT** the records center, larger in floor space than the Empire State Building and second only to the Pentagon in size, was doused with 50 million gallons of water during the fire, which raged out of control for two days.

Arson was considered a possibility because there have been about a dozen small fires in the building in the last two years, most of them started in wastebaskets, Kunkel noted.

Other possibilities being considered, he said, are accident, spontaneous combustion and electrical faults.

On October 12, 1973, the facts of this matter were preliminarily discussed with United States Attorney DONALD J. STOHR and Assistant United States Attorney TERRY I. ADELMAN, Eastern District of Missouri, St. Louis, Missouri. It was determined through review of all information available at that time including [redacted] signed statement, that insufficient evidence existed to authorize a complaint against the subject. Additional investigation was requested in the form of interviews of five persons to whom [redacted] made statements claiming responsibility for the fire, medical and educational background, and an investigative report incorporating all such investigation.

On October 22, 1973, this matter was discussed with United States Attorney DONALD J. STOHR who was in receipt of an Federal Bureau of Investigation report of investigation. STOHR indicated that a preliminary review of information contained in the report indicated that there is insufficient evidence against [redacted] to authorize prosecution. STOHR indicated that [redacted] statement, which describes the Records Center fire as starting from his negligent smoking, is not incriminating and that statements made to his fellow workers that he set the fire were not sufficiently strong so as to warrant initiation of criminal proceedings. STOHR advised that he wished to solicit the opinions of his staff as to a proper course of action to be taken in the matter and requested a follow-up contact.

On October 23, 1973, Assistant United States Attorney J. PATRICK GLYNN, Eastern District of Missouri, St. Louis, Missouri, advised that this matter had been assigned to him for review. He stated that two alternative courses of action have been determined, neither of which involves authorization for immediate filing of a complaint

and arrest of the subject. GLYNN said the two alternatives are referral to the General Services Administration for administrative action and presentation of evidence in this matter to a Federal Grand Jury for consideration in its investigative capacity. GLYNN explained that this procedure simply utilizes the investigative characteristics of a Federal Grand Jury and does not necessarily imply the seeking of a determination as to indictment. GLYNN stated that the first alternative, administrative handling by the General Services Administration, should be initiated through contact of appropriate General Services Administration officials by the United States Attorney for the Eastern District of Missouri. GLYNN stated that depending on resulting necessities, a decision will be made as to whether presentation of the evidence in this matter should be made to the Federal Grand Jury convening on October 31, 1973.

For information of Bureau, TERRY GENE DAVIS, who in interview set forth in referenced report furnished strongest information implicating [REDACTED] in captioned fire, discovered dead 8:30 PM, 11/5/73. It appeared DAVIS victim of suicide. DAVIS who resides [REDACTED] [REDACTED] at NPROC-M, [REDACTED] in a secluded rural setting, had not reported for work since 10/30/73. [REDACTED] stated he had not seen DAVIS at home since that time even though lights had been left on in DAVIS' cabin. At about 8:30 PM, 11/5/73, [REDACTED] looked into DAVIS' window and observed his corpse with a shotgun propped between his legs and the majority of his head blown away.

Subsequent investigation determined DAVIS killed himself with a 16 guage pump shotgun after having left the following note:

"There just isn't any point to any of this. Nobody gives a damn and never has. Blame it on dope. Blame it on parents. But people \*\*\* are the cause of all the \_\_\_\_\_ in the world. All I ever needed was to know that somebody gave a damn about anything to do with me.

"Where is truth? Where is love? Where is anything that is real? Thank you KADI. Thank you KSHE. Thank you humanity."

Mention of KADI and KSHE are apparent references to local radio stations emphasizing rock and roll type music. DAVIS' main ambition in the world was to become a star rock and roll performer.

Coroner's report estimates date of death as 11/1/73, as judged by state of decomposition of the body and reports that he had been seen alive prior to that time.

DAVIS was honorably discharged from the U.S. Coast Guard 11/23/71, due to psychiatric difficulties involving depression and anxiety. Fellow workers at the record center indicated DAVIS had been periodically depressed since long prior to the fire at the records center. Within the last two weeks DAVIS had been involved in a minor accident with his car, was arrested on his motorcycle in a prohibited wildlife area and had been disturbed over his relationship with his parents. DAVIS had also broken off with his girlfriend who had been living with him on 10/27/73. She returned on 10/29/73, for her personal belongings and declined to remain with DAVIS at his request but "on his terms". DAVIS' girlfriend claimed that DAVIS was injecting "speed".

DAVIS' friends and working associates at the record center deny he was particularly concerned or upset over events involving the record center fire and that his death would most likely have nothing to do with the [redacted] investigation or the fire itself. DAVIS' friends indicated he may have planned his own death over considerable period of time as he felt "possessed of a demon" and told them he had been "seeing and feeling things" that they could not understand. While DAVIS exhibited certain elements of instability to his friends, he generally

Review of the above captioned investigation reveals that an admission of having set the fire was obtained from subject, a custodial worker at NPROC-M and that appropriate discussion was held with the U. S. Attorney concerning obtaining an indictment. U. S. Attorney indicated that due to [redacted] prosecution was unlikely.

Evidence obtained during the investigation was presented by the U. S. Attorney to a federal grand jury on 10/31/73. The federal grand jury failed to vote an indictment, however, and investigation was closed. File was reopened upon receipt of a portion of a military service record of [redacted] of Nashville, Tennessee who referred to the fire and a lead to interview him was set out. A check of his military record showed that he served in the U. S. Marine Corps 11/43 to 5/46 and [redacted] during his period of service. The Memphis Division interviewed [redacted] mother, [redacted]

On August 11, 1976, I received a telephone call at my residence from a person identifying himself as [redacted] from McDonnell-Douglas Aircraft Corporation and former Civil Servant. The call was received at about 7:00 p.m. and lasted about 15 minutes. [redacted] advised that he had received a copy of the FBI report on the 1973 fire at the Military Personnel Records Center, St. Louis, Missouri from some source via his rights under the Freedom of Information Act. [redacted] indicated that he had read the report and in his opinion, it was inconclusive and was an FBI "cover-up" of a serious attempt at Arson by political figures that wanted records of some unspecified nature (I think tapes were mentioned) destroyed. [redacted] also mentioned that a person named [redacted] (sp?) of the General Accounting Office, was not satisfied with the FBI investigation (I think this may have come from the FBI report that he supposedly had). [redacted] stated that he had been attempting to get a copy of the GSA report on the fire but did not indicate what means or channel he was using to get the report. [redacted] said that he had retired from McDonnell-Douglas after [redacted] years of employment and that he had been devoting most of his time to "investigating" the Military Personnel Record Center fire since his retirement since it (the fire) was similar to one the occurred at another Federal (I think VA was mentioned) building some years past and he was sure that the fires was set by the same person. He also mentioned an impending fire but did not specify A location. He stated that he had talked with GSA Special Agent [redacted] some time in the Spring of 1976 and that [redacted] had told him to contact him when he [redacted] had more information. [redacted] felt that he now had this information and had attempted to contact [redacted] and was furnished my name by [redacted] at National Personnel Records Center, Civilian Personnel Records, St. Louis, Missouri. [redacted] indicated that he was now in a position to name the person that has "set" the fire at the Military Personnel Records Center and that he wanted to talk to a GSA Agent about it. [redacted] stated that an interview would take about two (2) hours and he was agreeable to any meeting place as long as he was able to tape the interview so he would be correctly quoted in any report. I asked few if any questions about the nature of the information he could furnish. I advised him that it was not GSA policy to interfere in an other investigative agencies investigation or to question their findings. Reference is made to your letter of August 17, 1976.

In my telephone conversation with GSA Special Agent [REDACTED] August 11, 1976, I told him that I had information relating to the fire at the Military Records Center, Overland, Missouri, July 11/12, 1973, and that I would give him this information on condition that I would be permitted to record the interview from beginning to end.

[REDACTED] said that he thought that the GSA might be unwilling to conduct an interview under such conditions. He promised, however, that he would relay my proposal to you and that you would write me. Your letter, rather than accepting my proposal, is fully devoted to a discussion that I had with GSA Special Agent [REDACTED] May 19, 1976. b7C

An unsolicited inquiry which I have received from a Member of Congress who appears to have an interest in the matter - in addition to information which he did not describe - indicates a good possibility that you may be called upon in the course of a Congressional hearing to explain why GSA is unwilling to permit the recording of an interview relating to the fire.

The FBI and the Department of Justice have established a pattern of deceit in their investigation of the fire. I cannot understand GSA's willingness to become involved in the deceit. I have even had lying from your [REDACTED] But perhaps deceit is being used in an effort to avoid involvement in deceit.
