MOS was at work today. He scanned a sick report on the Sgt's desk & said he was going out sick. Sgt told him to stick around & he refused & left. Didn't follow procedure. Typically, they call sick desk ^{station} unit & cannot to arrange coverage. MOS was working on T.S.

MOS did not go straight home. Cops are at his home waiting for his arrival. They called MOS on his cell phone. They think he picked up & then hung up. Since then, no answer. They are thinking of arresting him but they suspect it is more of a psych. problem. XO of MOS' command (81st) is Capt Lauterborn & request response per LES. ——— C. Jordan Pys

T/C Capt Lauterborn

MOS doing a 7-3 day tour today, at TS all day. all was fine. He typically keeps to self & doesn't converse much with other than, odd ones today. Nothing seemed out of ordinary.

DPA - he went down to locker room, changed & then put a sick report on Sgt's desk & sd going sick. He wrote that he had stomach pains. Sgt tried to stop him but he left anyway.

Underlying issues - MOS has made allegations against others. Dept's investigation of these allegations started up this week & it snowballed from there. This week, about 4 PO's & 2 civilian people were called down for questioning. MOS goes up to them & asks about it, notifications are in telephone message log so he knows who is going. When they return, he tries to intercept them & get info from them about what he was asked. Today was 1st tour back after RDO's, not sure what happened today that triggered him to leave like that.

acts of aggression. Much easier to just reach it
quickly & easily now. I explained that we're in just
concerned for his safety & they want to make sure he is ok.

- The Capt Lauterborn - I urged Capt that I left
msg on MOS' cell phone as described above I suggested Capt
call MOS' father b/c that's the person he is closest to & the
person who is most likely to know his whereabouts. Capt will
call w/ us when he hears or hear from MOS.

addendum to 10/31/09 note of T/C - Capt Lauterbach not upper

1750 hours. Delayed entry made on 10/14/10, in reviewing
follo, the below info was found to not be documented in prior notes, but
is clear in US' memory. Capt Lauterbach asked if MOS was
suicidal or depressed, because he needed to know how concerned they
should be about MOS' safety given his going away, not answering phone
calls, not answering door of home but he can hear things, etc. I informed
Capt that I last saw MOS at PES on 10/27/09 & at that time
he looked ok & reported being asymptomatic. At no time had he
ever expressed thoughts of suicide, but he also never was true before
& after the way he was acting on 10/31/09. My assessment of his
suicide risk is only as good as the last time I saw him. All security
happened after that & led him to be so upset that he left work
without permission on home before the end of his term, said he had
stomach pains, etc, that I am unable to say with any reasonable
amount of certainty that he is not at risk of STI under present
circumstances. I provided Capt with basic info about reason
MOS was on R/P - that he had significant physical Sx of stress
(Monday G-2 Sx, Cardiac Sx, etc). Unlikely if MOS was
reporting Sx on 10/27/09 when he said all of his Sx went away
w/o Tx, Motivation to minimize is that he did not want to be on P/R/D,
he was open during initial eval but denied any Sx in subsequent
monitoring sessions, when also expressed being upset about being on P/R/D. His reporting
on 10/31/09 that he had stomach pains same enough to prevent being work before
end of term, w/o previous reports either the Sx never did go away or
they recurred on 10/31/09 due to his being really upset about security.
It is also possible there was a medical cause for the stomach pains
but the angry manner in which he left work suggests a psych. cause.

d. explained to MOS that d. called him in immediately upon my return from a 2-wk vacation b/c d. received msg. that his father made a complaint downtown that d. never told MOS the reason why he is on R/D. Since we had discussed that in detail at his initial & subsequent visits, d. emphatically expressed an uncertainty of how he may not have wanted to tell his father the reason why he was on R/D. To make sure that he has a clear understanding of why he is on R/D, d. again explained in detail that he is on R/D b/c he had significant physical manifestations of stress that were causing much discomfort & would benefit from treatment & further monitoring.

MOS said he no longer has these physical signs of stress even though he is still facing the same stresses on buses, while on R/D, he is not afraid of PCT dealing with complaints all day long - not stressful to him, but not very fun either (in his opinion) as regular F/D work.

d. again recommends stress mgmt & relaxation training so the next time he is faced with new increased stresses, he won't have a recurrence of the chest pain, headaches, insomnia, upset stomach, etc. that he had for several months when he 1st came to PES. He said he bought both books d. recommended & started reading them, but not that helpful since not much he didn't know before. He thought the Burns book was kind of corny & preferred the Ellis book. He ~~said~~ bought both books to today's ^{date} ~~date~~ or had both made in them, ^{but} not very far into them (so hasn't read much of them). He said he called a few people d. recommended but saw John A. extra & one wanted \$400/hour ^{& asked if he had any of the CD's} & told him d. could help him find an Action Program & to sure they must cover CBT for physical signs of stress. He said he would call later to his provider # & name of his exact HMO plan so d. can make sure the provider is in-network. MOS expressed an appreciation for the assistance.

Made entry using key b/c landlord heard foot steps. He said he was sleeping whole time but not possible with the amount of banging & yelling they were doing outside before going in with the key to make sure he was ok. Not sure what occurred.

He admitted that Sgt called him back & denied him the sick leave, but that he left the command anyway. Capt explained that they were concerned b/c he said sick & they didn't know why he left in such a hurry that way.

MOS sd "why would you not see me later worried about me before?" He refused to go to command & kept saying he didn't feel well. ^{Capt} Called ambulance. EMT's took his vitals.

BP very high. 170/120.

EMT wanted him to go to hosp. b/c BP so high. MOS opt'd ~~then~~ MOS agreed but then refused. He ran back inside or had to be strapped down & forcibly taken to Brazo Hospital. (MOS ~~sd~~ said he wanted to sleep at home & would go to ER on over the next day, but EMT couldn't do that b/c BP so high. Chief Melina was there & suspended him.

MOS was very disrespectful in every way. Chief gave him so much room but MOS out of control & total disrespect for supervisors.

Whole time talking to father on cell phone. Could hear father yelling. (as MOS or to him about situation?) Next of MOS, Father angry about MILP's handling of this & other situations & MOS. Father doesn't have accurate info, in fact libelous.
